From our Principal, Mr David Harriss

Welcome to the last newsletter for Term 2, and what a term it has been for everyone! On behalf of all the staff and particularly the students, I would like to thank everyone for their support and sincerely hope that as restrictions ease your lives can begin to move more towards what will become the "new normal".

From a school perspective, classes have quickly reverted to complete face-to-face delivery, with many staff and students utilising the new skills and technology we developed during remote learning to good effect. Overall, students were very happy to be back at school and have developed a greater sense of the importance of face-to-face interactions with their teachers, and certainly revelled in being able to see their friends more readily.

Reports

The release of reports has been delayed until early next term to allow teachers to use every available lesson this term to complete all learning tasks for Semester 1. I will inform you when the reports are released on DayMap. We are looking forward to starting Semester 2 as a fresh start and trust we will have no more interruptions to the face-to-face teaching program from COVID-19.

External School review

As part of our continuous school improvement process, we will be involved in an external school review with a Department for Education review panel. The purpose of external school reviews is to support us to raise achievement, sustain high performance and provide quality assurance to build public confidence in government schools. All government schools go through an external review every 3 years.

The focus of the external school review is to evaluate our school's performance. The review panel includes a review officer and a trained review principal. Our school review will occur on Monday 10th and Tuesday 11th August (Week 4 next term). The review panel will verify aspects of our school's improvement through the review processes, as well as the improvements that we need to make in the future.

- group discussions (with students or staff or parents)
- meetings (governing council, staff meeting)
- classroom visits.

We appreciate everyone's support and time in helping us with this external school review process. On Monday Week 1 next term, you will receive an information sheet with a reply slip to return to school reception if you do not wish your child to participate. Please contact me by phone through reception or by email if you would like more information.

Building Program

Some physical changes will start in Week 1 when our building program begins in earnest next term, with the removal of the old Music and Weight Training Room near the oval. Music and some Art classes will relocate until the new Creative Arts Centre is finished early next year. We are all looking forward to delivering our high quality Arts programs in this new facility. Some of the weights equipment will continue to be used elsewhere until the completion of the new Human Physical Performance Centre (attached to the current Gymnasium) later in 2021. Science and Knowledge corridors will be refurbished from late Term 3 and are due for completion early in Term 1, 2021. A great deal of planning is being done to ensure the learning of our students is not impacted by the building works, although we will all need to be flexible and understanding of the changes in the physical location of our classes.

Year 7s in 2022

Planning is also under way in preparation for welcoming our new cohort of Year 7s in 2022 – it seems a long way off, but careful consideration is being given to ensure these students are coming into a learning environment that best caters for their particular needs. This includes the curriculum, teaching staff, leaders and the physical environment. After all, they will not be just another younger cohort of Year 8 students!

Year 12 Students

For our Year 12s, Term 3 will be, and always has been, a challenging time. It is a term when a large number of learning tasks are being finalised and the demands on their time are going to intensify. Students will feel that all of their assignments seem to be due at the same time, which is determined by the deadlines the SACE board has in place for submission of results. It will be imperative that they are supported to manage their time effectively to meet all of the deadlines they will face, particularly as other aspects of their social, sporting and leisure lives are starting to free up with restrictions easing. Your support and continued communication with them and their teachers will become more important than ever. We are very confident that the important end of year celebrations, such as the Final Assembly, Graduation and Formal will be able to proceed as planned.

Pathways Planning

Early next term, the remaining students will begin the structured process of planning their pathway and selecting the appropriate 2021 subjects to match that pathway. There will be information sessions for both students and parents, and much information available through our Website and other resources that are available. This process will take up the first half of the term, culminating in Course Confirmation sessions in Week 6 where parents and students meet with Home Group teachers to finalise subject selection. I look forward to meeting you all at those events.


COVID Inquiry Project


