#### Year 12 News

#### **Building Works**

The building works are moving along very quickly, builders are confident of delivering on time, if not a little early, which will help at the start of next year. I need to commend our staff and students for the way they have been so flexible in adapting to the physical surrounds in which they have had their lessons, whilst not impacting on their learning. Governing Council went on a tour of the building site at their last meeting, and were very impressed by the scope of work being done around the school. ### Site Improvement Plan (SIP)

We are currently reviewing the goals we have in our 2020 Site Improvement Plan and analysis of the PAT data we have indicates that once again we have exceeded our expectations. (Please see article from Anne Bell in this Newsletter).

We are now well and truly into planning our 2021 SIP being guided by the feedback from our External Review and the Department. We will be raising the bar even higher with our Literacy (Reading) and Numeracy goals, and adding a third goal around increasing the proportion of students achieving A and B grades across all year levels, with particular emphasis on our SACE results.

### From our Principal, Mr David Harriss

#### 2021 Enrolments

Ongoing data shows that we should be around the 600 mark next year, with approximately 120 Year 8s entering our school next year. This is what we have predicted and planned on over the last few years, and when Year 7s come on board in 2022, we should be around the 700 mark.

#### Year 7s in 2022

We are making many plans to prepare for Year 7s joining us in 2022, including our lesson structure approved by your Governing Council (details of which are in this newsletter), our curriculum structure, staffing and the physical aspects of the school that need addressing to cater for these students. We already have a Year Level Leader appointed, who will start next year and do a lot of the preparation work in conjunction with our leadership team, including working closely with our feeder primary schools. We are in the middle of a process of appointing teachers who are currently in Primary Schools (and some R-12 and Area Schools) who have indicated a desire and aptitude to teach in secondary schools. They will start in 2022, but have the ability to prepare over the next 12 months for entry into our school community. We are also investigating what types of play spaces are appropriate for our new students in 2022.

#### **Term 4 Arrangements**

It is important that all students finish the year off strongly. Learning at this time of the year has a big impact on how they start in 2021. We are building in time for students to prepare for exams, complete tasks to the best of their ability, and continue to develop their skills in independent learning. Please see Lee Knight's article in this edition that outlines arrangements for the rest of the term.

Thank you for your continued work with us to meet the needs of all our students .

### **End of year arrangements Year 8 and Year 9**

All lessons will conclude for Year 8 & 9 students on Friday of week 8 (Friday 4<sup>th</sup> Dec). This will include a final celebratory assembly to congratulate our middle school students.

Please ensure that your child has returned all books and other equipment loaned from the school. If your student has a lease laptop this will need to be returned and in January a new lease agreement completed. Lease laptop are generally only available for families eligible for school card. If you are no longer eligible in 2021, laptops can be purchased though the school website at a good price and on 24 months interest free if required.

Week 9 (December 7<sup>th</sup>-11<sup>th</sup>) will include a variety of additional events and activities as outlined below.

### **End of year arrangements Year 10 and Year 11**

Week 7 - Friday 27th November is the last day for year 10 and 11 students

Week 8 - Monday 2nd to 6th December lessons as normal for all year 8 and 9 students

Week 9 - Please refer to letters that are being sent home for more specific details about the week 9 program for year 8 and 9 students.

On Thursday 10th and Friday 12th students will be dismissed at 1:00pm.

Year 11 and Year 10 students will have their last day of lessons on Friday November 27<sup>th</sup> (end of week 7). ### **New Timetable 2021**

In 2021 we will be moving to a new timetable as outlined below. This has come after 2 years of consultation with leaders, staff and analysis of timetables from other sites.

The new timetable will allow all our students to see the teacher of each class 3 times per week. All subjects will also have a lesson early in the day to allow for an intensive focus on literacy and numeracy development across all subjects. Staff will continue to participate in a collaborative professional learning time however, in 2021 this will move from Wednesday afternoon to a Monday morning. This allows all of our staff to attend, as it no longer clashes with Western region Sports which many of our teachers coach.

School will begin at 8:35am Tuesday – Friday and at 9:45am on Monday. Each school day will finish at 3:10pm. On Tuesday and Wednesday there is a lesson scheduled from 3:15-4:30pm for students who required extra support to complete and submit work by due dates. This is also when the Year 12 Research Project class will be held for students who have not completed Research Project in 2020, whilst in Year 11.

The Student Voice have provided feedback on the timetable and Governing Council have unanimously approved the change. If you have any questions please contact us for further clarification.



# Student Exemptions from attending school

Forms must be picked up TWO WEEKS before leave starts. Parents or guardians wanting to take their child out of school temporarily or permanently must apply for an exemption through their school. Students must attend school regularly until the exemption has been approved by the principals. Students can obtain exemption forms from the front office.

### The Lyn Fullston Medal - Winner Erin Murphy

The Lyn Fullston Medal is named after a former Underdale High School teacher who passed away tragically in 2008. Lyn was highly regarded by staff and students at Underdale High School and she was the Optimism Sub school head and a Health and Physical Education and Maths teacher. Lyn was an accomplished and exceptional sports woman, representing South Australia in Cricket, Netball, Soccer and Basketball, and Australia in Cricket and Netball. Lyn played cricket for Australia in 12 test Matches and 41 one day Internationals, holding the World record (39) for the most wickets taken in World Cup games. She was affectionately known as "Lefty".





Throughout Erin's time at Underdale High School she has proven to be an excellent role model for female students and is a worthy winner of the Lyn Fullston Award.

One of Erin's key qualities is her willingness to participate in a range of physical activities. Whilst at Underdale she has contributed heavily to the extra-curricular sports program by taking part in athletics, volleyball, handball and football. Erin has also participated to great effect in the Schools Sports Day and Athletics Carnivals. She often was prepared to 'fill in' when the school had a gap in an event as well as competing in the events that she has been selected for. This ability to surpass our expectations has resulted in her being selected as Sports Captain for Resilience House from Year 8, right through to Year 12.

### The David Hookes Medal-Winner Stanisa Velinov

David Hookes was a state and national cricket representative who attended Underdale High School as a student. In his first test, the 1977 Centenary Test against England, he gained immediate popularity with Australian crowds by hitting the England captain, Tony Grieg for 5 consecutive boundaries. Other highlights include a 43 minute, 34 ball century and a highest score of 306 not out, which is what this award is named after.



The David Hookes 306 Award recognizes a male student who has had outstanding involvement and performance in both school and community sport during their time at Underdale High School.

As well as the medallion, the recipient has their name recorded on the David Hookes 306 perpetual trophy displayed in the school's trophy cabinet.

Stanisa has been an excellent ambassador of Underdale High School Sport, and is a worthy recipient of the David Hookes Award. Within his time at the school he has represented the Football team with Distinction. He has contributed to the school winning 5-a-side and futsal Western Zone & State accolades, and was an instrumental player in winning the 11 aside Knockout State trophy in Year 11, representing the Open Boys team.

Since arriving at the School, Stanisa has also developed his Leadership skills by successfully taking on the role of Vice-Captain for Optimism House.



### The Vocational Education and Training Award - Winner Priyansh Uppal

This award recognises an individual who has demonstrated outstanding commitment and achievement in their vocational pathway. Through the Western Adelaide Secondary Schools Network, students can undertake Vocational Education Courses in a variety of areas, including Automotive, Business, Community & Health Services, Construction, Creative Arts, Engineering, Information Technology in media and Sports & Recreation. To be eligible for this award, students must have either undertaken a VET course in Year 12, or completed a Certificate III in Year 11.

Priyansh completed a Certificate III in Information, Digital Media and Technology. He has applied to study a Bachelor of Computer Science next year. Throughout his time at Underdale High School, he has been known as the tech wizard, regularly helping out both students and staff with their IT concerns. I know there were some times when our IT staff were worried they might be out of a job! Priyansh's outstanding people skills, in addition to his passion for technology, will ensure he is successful in this pathway in the future.



### The Helen Castle Memorial Award- Winner Phoebe Field

Helen Castle taught at Underdale for 10 years and contributed to an active promotion of science in the school community, was hard working and passionate about Science and always wanted her students to achieve their best. Helen tragically died during the Eyre Peninsula fires in 2005.



This award recognizes a student who has demonstrated excellence in the field of science and contributed positively in this area. They need to have participated in more than one science subject in their senior years and are possibly looking for a science pathway in the future.

Phoebe is a worthy recipient of the Helen Castle Science award. She is a highly motivated, hardworking student who always strives to perform at her best. Phoebe is a creative and independent thinker and always produces work of high quality. Her work this year in Biology demonstrated an excellent understanding and insight into the role that Biology plays in the current society. She has also studied Chemistry through the Open Access college and achieved excellent results. These qualities will hold her in good stead for her future studies.

### The Principal's Award- Winner Chloe Sciancalepore

This prestigious award is based on SACE performance and the demonstration of school values.

Chloe is exemplary in all ways – intelligent, conscientious, reliable and always open to constructive feedback. She always gives things a go, and is highly supportive of her peers. She has love of learning, excellent collaborative skills and the courage and determination to broaden her knowledge and understanding to keep improving. Chloe is an independent and reflective thinker, a role model for all our students and is highly regarded for her outstanding maturity and determination. Chloe has achieved A and B grades across her SACE subjects and clearly demonstrates our school values. She is a worthy recipient of the Principal's Award.



### **Governing Council ROCK Award-Winner Saverio Scriva**

This award recognizes the student who has in their time at Underdale exhibited the qualities and characteristics embodied in the school's sub-school names of Resilience, Optimism, Courage and Knowledge (the first letters of each quality make up the award name)

Saverio has always demonstrated the school's values, and has been a great ambassador over the last five years. Saverio has exhibited quiet resilience, achieving high academic results in the face of challenges. As Captain of Optimism House, he has personified that particular criteria through his eagerness to always find the positives in a situation. His sporting achievements have shown that he is an effective leader, collaborating with peers and coaches both on and off the sporting field. This collaboration has similarly been seen in the classroom, with Saverio demonstrating courage in both seeking out and offering support throughout his schooling. He is hard working, and respectful to all those he encounters. He has contributed positively to our school culture, demonstrating himself as a positive role model to our Year 8s on the first day of school.



### The Community Service Award- Winner Jemma Manfre

This award is presented in the spirit of Sir John Hindmarsh whom the federal seat of Hindmarsh is named after. Sir John Hindmarsh was the first Governor of South Australia from 1836 to 1838. This award recognises a student who has provided service to the school community, has well developed awareness of others and their needs, participates in school activities with a positive attitude and is fully committed to the ethos of the school. This award also comes with a sponsorship from the federal member for Hindmarsh Mr Mark Butler, and their name on the perpetual Hindmarsh shield displayed in the school's cabinet.

Jemma has been a member of our Student Voice since Year 8. Her commitment to ensuring student voices are being heard when decisions are being made about the improvement of our school has been outstanding. She ensures that all students are given an opportunity to speak up and also speaks on their behalf, accurately and passionately. She has taken leadership of the creation and management of the second-hand uniform shop, ensuring equity of access to uniform for all students. Jemma has led whole school celebrations and fundraisers for Harmony Day and Bullying No Way Day. She provided peer support and practical assistance in the running of the Year 8 camp as a Year 11 student. Jemma's community service has extended to being a student mentor during Year 7 transition, speaking to parents at Open Night and on school tours. She was Captain of Courage on Sports Day and comperes whole school assemblies.



Before we congratulate Jemma on this award, we have an exciting announcement to make. As a result of all Jemma has achieved with her community service over the last 5 years, the staff at Underdale High nominated her for the Student Citizenship Awards, which are organised by The Order of Australia Association. The awards are intended to recognise young people who contribute broadly through voluntary service to school and general communities. They exemplify the Association's objective "to foster love of, and pride in Australian citizenship".

We are very pleased to announce that after consideration by the assessment and selection panel, Jemma is to be awarded a Highly Commended Certificate, one of only ten students in the state who were selected. As we were only informed of the award last week, we do not yet have the certificate, which will be signed both by the Governor of South Australia, and the South Australian Branch Chair of The Order of Australia Association, but we wanted to acknowledge Jemma's achievement tonight.



### The Australian Defence Force Long Tan Award-Winner Leoj Agbong

The Long Tan award is an important initiative by the Australian Government in conjunction with the Australian defence force designed to encourage senior students – tomorrow's leaders – to actively participate in the life of their school and local community. The Battle of Long Tan holds a special place in the hearts and minds of many Australians and this award, sponsored by the Australian Defence Force, is a tribute to the determination, mateship, teamwork, tenacity, compassion and leadership demonstrated by the Long Tan veterans. These are the attributes and values we have identified in the recipient of this prestigious award.

Leoj encompasses all of the qualities upheld by the Long Tan Award. His determination is evident in his persistence with his academics, overcoming his English as a Second Language status to achieve solid grades in his years of schooling. Leoj is a friend to all, treating students and staff respectfully and kindly, and engaging positively as part of the Underdale team. His compassion is demonstrated by his completion of a Certificate III in Individual Support (Aged Care), and he has been volunteering in an Aged Care centre. He would like to pursue a career in Nursing, further emphasising his caring and compassionate nature. In Year 10, Leoj took on



a leadership role in documenting the Aquatics event for his peers, and creating a film of that event to share with the cohort. He was also a Year 11 mentor on Year 8 camp, establishing himself as a positive role model for our younger students.

### The Success Through Resilience Award - Winner Sophie Paues



Many of our students have achieved successful academic and personal outcomes despite the many challenges that present themselves throughout their journey. This award recognizes a student who has experienced and overcome challenges in achieving their academic and personal goals and along the way has supported their peers and others in the community.

Resilience is a trait that Sophie has demonstrated in abundance throughout her schooling, but particularly in 2020. Sophie has ensured that the impact of Year 12 in a pandemic has never hindered her success. She is a quiet achiever, seeking out support as needed, and communicating effectively with her teachers. There was a period of time this year when she was unable to attend school, but this in no way impacted her results. She maintained high levels of communication and resilience throughout this period, and is to be commended on her dedication to her schooling despite the challenges she has faced.

### The Caltex All-Rounder Award - Winner Chloe Sciancalepore

For 30 years the Caltex All-Rounder award has been presented to students and has become one of Australia's best known and recognized secondary school awards. This award recognizes a student who is a genuine "All-rounder" excelling in many aspects of school life.

Chloe has embraced all areas of schooling, including great academic success due to her willingness to put in the effort. She has also been a participant in many sporting activities and is active in the Community through her involvement with the Police work experience program and local sporting clubs. She has demonstrated commitment, initiative and maturity during Sports Day in her role as Team manager for Resilience and was ever present in supporting her peers and encouraging younger students to be involved. Chloe has a strong academic record, great attitude and excellent leadership qualities. She is a valued member of our school community and a worthy recipient of the Caltex All-rounder Award.



### **Australian Defence Force Future Innovators Award Winner Phoebe Field**

The Australian Defence Force (ADF) Future Innovators Award has been designed to recognise recipients' science and mathematics abilities while highlighting the value the Navy, Army and Air Force place on STEM skills and STEM career opportunities within Defence. The awards are a means to formally recognise those students who have demonstrated motivation and innovation in the areas of STEM within their school, and who display strong personal ethical values, such as doing one's best.

Phoebe has a strong interest in Science and Maths, undertaking subjects in both of these areas throughout her schooling, with outstanding results. She is supportive to those around her, and always strives to achieve her best. Phoebe will be travelling to Canberra next year, after being offered a 'Changing Futures Scholarship' to study a double degree in Psychology & Criminology at the Australian National University, with a selection rank of 97.1



### **Subject & Bright Futures 2020**

Bright Future Awards are awarded to the students who exemplify Courage, Resilience and Optimism. Students who receive this award have achieved their potential and maximized their success through organisation, hard work and determination. ### Year 12 Graduation—Valedictorian Speech




# Underdale High School Teaching and Learning Community – Closing Gaps and Raising Standards!

As many of you will know, we have a strong focus on literacy and numeracy improvement at Underdale High School and each year we report on how our school community is traveling with this work. In 2020, despite the many unsettling aspects we have all been living with, you have reason to feel proud of your children once again!

Every middle school year level has once again outperformed the state and national standard in average score improvements in PAT Reading and PAT Numeracy, which is a testament to the work your children and their teachers are doing right across the school. Every classroom contributes to this improvement, through a focus on the literacies and numeracies of each learning area, supporting and magnifying the work of our Maths and English teachers.

Our aim is to achieve strong growth through the middle years, to prepare our students for success in senior school. Once again, this year's batch of year 10s have shown resilience and powerful learning in closing significant gaps during their middle years. Here's how it looks in reading:



The chart shows how students have moved from lower score bands to mid, and mid to high, to a point where we have a higher than average number of students in the high bands (26%) and only 24% in lower bands – a huge achievement, when you consider the cohort began with only 7% in the higher bands, and 38% in the lower. This, and many other encouraging and affirming data will be available in our School Report later this year.

We thank you for the way you are supporting your children's growth and our work, and look forward to even better results for your children in the future.

### Geography

Geography students from Underdale High School tested their geographical skills and knowledge against student from all around Australia in the 2020 Australian Geography Competition.

Geography teachers Kellie Woolford and Don Pappageorgiou said they had recently received the results and were pleased with how their students had performed.

"We have a number of student geographers at our school who performed to a very high level in the Competition this year. Of the 14 students who volunteered to participate, 1 achieved a high distinction, 1 a distinction and 3 achieved credits" said Miss Woolford.

"It's been a challenging year for schools with the pandemic, so we were happy to still be able to give our students the opportunity to test themselves against students from all around Australia, with over 65,000 students entering," she added.

Kath Berg, the Competition's national coordinator, said "The Competition aims to encourage student interest in geography and to reward student excellence."

"Geography is such an important subject because it develops in students a holistic understand of the world around them, and their place in it," said Ms Berg.

Australia's team to the next International Geography Olympiad is chosen from year 11 students who excel in the Competition. The next Olympiad is scheduled to take place in Istanbul, turkey, in August 2021. Funding to support the Australian team and its training is provided by the Australian Department of Education, Skills and Employment (DESE). Whether an Olympiad is held in 2021 will depend on the COVID-19 situation.

The Competition is a joint initiative of the Australian Geography Teachers' Association and the Royal Georaphical Society of Queensland. In addition to the funding from DESE, sponsorship is received from the University of Queensland and University of Western Australia.

### 2020 South Australian Schools Constitutional Convention

On Friday, 18 September, four Year 11 girls; Alice, Hayley, Neena and I, participated in the 2020 South Australian Schools Constitutional Convention. This year the event was held remotely and was heaps of fun! We had a chance to meet other students online, listen to presentations on the Australian Constitution and politics, and then ask questions. The presenters were all amazing and their presentations were engaging and informative. At the end of the day we were given the opportunity to submit an application to participate in the National Schools Constitutional Convention which takes place in Canberra early each year. Using the knowledge learnt on the day, we students submitted entries arguing for change to the Australian Constitution. ### **School procedures for Parents/Caregivers**

### Illness/Early leave sign out & late arrival sign in procedures

Unfortunately we have had a large number of students not following procedures that have been put in place when they are feeling unwell, they have to leave school early or they arrive late to school. The information below outlines the procedures all students must follow.

### Feeling unwell?

Recently, too many students have been calling or messaging their parents/caregivers during class to inform them they are unwell. As you can imagine, this becomes problematic when a teacher is trying to teach a lesson.

After the student has contacted their parent/caregiver, they then have to contact the school to let us know that their child who is here at school is unwell. This then means a staff member has to leave their duties to go and find the student, get them to go to the Book Room to sign out and go home. Seems like a lot of work right? But wait there is a much easier way to achieve the same result!

### A much easier procedure:

When a student is feeling unwell, they need to tell their current lesson teacher who will then send them to Student Services.

The Student Services staff member will then phone the student's parent/caregiver to inform them of their illness, and organise for them to be picked up and who will be picking them up.

**OR** - If the parent / caregiver would like their child to walk or catch the bus home, they must call the school back when their child arrives home, thus to confirm the student has arrived home safely.

### Need to leave early?

If for any reason a student needs to leave school early, they **must** have a note signed by a parent / caregiver which gives them permission to leave school and **why**.

The student will need to show this signed note to their **current lesson teacher**, who will then grant them permission to leave class. The student is then to go to **student services**, show the staff member their signed note, and sign out.

### Late to school?

If students are late, they **must** go straight to **student services** and sign in.

If the student has a note from a parent / caregiver their lateness will be explained. If they don't, it will remain unexplained until a parent contacts the school to explain.

It's as easy as that! We do not have these procedures in place to be difficult. Staff at Underdale have a duty of care to all students. Following these procedures ensures the student's wellbeing and safety is accounted for at all times during school hours.
